A clean copy of the bulletin with proposed revisions is contained in Addendum C. A copy tracking the proposed changes is included in Addendum D.</p> <p>A summary of the proposed changes to <i>Intellectual Property Bulletin #1</i> includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Permission would be required to reprint book-length pieces. • Current policy that was not clearly expressed in the bulletin has been added to the text. Groups are only allowed to reproduce currently approved versions of recovery literature, as that is all that NAWS is authorized to publish and distribute, and this permission does not include electronic or online formats. • The introduction has been rewritten and the section on copyright has been moved ahead of the section on trademarks. • Some copyediting changes are suggested, such as using the term <i>policy</i> throughout the document, rather than a mix of <i>policy</i> and <i>guidelines</i>. Any motion to review proposed revisions to the Trust Instrument must receive the approval of a majority of regional delegates at the World Service Conference. 2. After such review is approved, proposed revisions will be open for a six-month review and input period, after which the proposed revisions will be presented in the <i>Conference Agenda Report</i> for adoption. 3. A motion to adopt any proposed revisions to the Trust Instrument will require a vote of “yes” from two-thirds of those regional delegates recorded as present in the World Service Conference roll call immediately prior to the vote. The form will include the following information:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) Maker b) Main topic/issue to discuss c) A question or questions to help guide discussion d) The intended outcomes of discussion (e.g., frame a project that has already been adopted or for consideration at a future WSC, create an Issue Discussion Topic for the upcoming cycle, frame new tools, evolve the Idea to create a 2022 CAR motion, etc.) e) Why the topic is important <p>2) The deadline for New Idea submissions will be 12:00 noon on Wednesday of the Conference week. The WSC Cofacilitators and World Board Chair will oversee the compilation of all submitted Ideas and will be responsible for the final presentation of the list to be distributed to Conference participants. The Ideas will be grouped by topic, with all of the detail included, to make prioritization and discussion more productive.</p> <p>3) New Idea Discussion packages and surveys will be distributed to Conference participants Wednesday evening.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) Each participant will be asked to complete the survey, identifying the topics they wish to discuss with a “yes” and those they do not wish to discuss with a “no.” Participants can choose to vote “yes” or “no” for every topic, none of the topics, or any number between. b) The deadline to complete and turn in New Idea Discussion surveys is noon Thursday. <p>4) Surveys will be tabulated; all results will be provided to Conference participants Thursday evening.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) The topics that receive the most “yes” votes will be identified for discussion in small groups, and the Conference will decide which of these topics to discuss in the small-group breakout sessions. b) All Ideas that were submitted and not discussed will be included in an appendix to the WSC minutes. <p>5) New Idea discussions will take place in two 90-minute breakout sessions on Friday.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) The WSC will meet as a large group prior to the start of the small-group discussions to review the topics and the Ideas listed within each, so that there is a common understanding of the process and goals. a) There will be at least five breakout rooms: two for RDs and ZDs, two for ADs, and one for Spanish-speaking participants. b) Each session in the breakout rooms will have time for both small- and large-group discussions on each topic. Each breakout room will be asked to agree on outcomes of their discussions to report back to the Conference. c) Session outcomes will be compiled in preparation for the Saturday morning session. <p>6) Large-group follow-up on small-group sessions (Saturday morning)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a) The Board will report the points of agreement or disagreement from the breakouts, and facilitate a discussion on how to move forward. b) Considering the amount of work already planned, we believe one new topic can be carried into the 2020–2022 cycle. Some topics discussed may feed into work already planned.
